EDUCATION CORNER



Districts of Innovation

Districts of Innovation (DOI) were created at the end of the 2015 legislative session by the Texas Legislature. Alleged to be an alternative to Home Rule. the DOI process will allow school districts to be freed of some of the Texas Education Agency requirements.

The description below is from the Texas Education Agency DOI page and is followed by pages of details.

"H.B. 1842 (84th Session of the Texas Legislature) in part amended Chapter 12 of the Texas Education Code (TEC) to create Districts of Innovations. Districts are eligible for designation if certain performance requirements are met and the district follows certain procedures for adoption as outlined in Statute. The designation provides the district will be exempt from certain sections of the TEC that inhibit the goals of the district as outlined in the locally adopted Innovation Plan."

At the 12-14-16 Dallas ISD Board meeting, the board approved starting the DOI process by the minimum super-majority trustee vote possible, 6 to 3. DISD will now begin to study becoming a District of Innovation. The process involves committee formation, study, public meetings and input, and eventually another super-majority trustee vote in April or May.

If you google "Districts of Innovation Texas," you will find multiple web sites on this topic that provide information, some in support and some against it. Some of the hits are from some of the 60 districts now in the same process as DISD. That number is changing constantly as the DOI alternative is only 18 months old. The TEA site above is the central information source.

The Association of Texas Professional Educators has a detailed web site about the history and procedures behind the DOI that is more critical of DOI. See https://www.atpe.org/en/DOI. It includes a section titled "Concerns about Innovation Districts."

The District of Innovation process is now in motion in Dallas ISD. You will be hearing about it in the media as it develops over the next few months.

Privatization and Vouchers

The Detroit Free Press published this article in May 2016 about the state's academic decline since 2003. This time period covers the era of Betsy DeVos, who has been a big proponent of vouchers for private schools and privatization of public schools in Michigan and who is the newly confirmed Secretary of Education in the Trump Administration.

"In 2003, Michigan ranked 28th in fourth-grade reading. In 2015, the state was ranked 41st."

"We're certainly not on track to become a top 10 state any time soon," said Amber Arellano, executive director of the Education trust-Midwest, a non-partisan education research and policy organization based in Royal Oak. "It's totally unacceptable for the economy, for business and especially for kids themselves."

Among the 2015 NAEP (National Assessment of Educational Progress) results highlighted in the

- Michigan ranked 41st in fourth-grade reading, down from 28th in 2003.
- The state ranked 42nd in fourth-grade math. down from 27th in 2003.
- It ranked 31st in eighth-grade reading, down from 27th in 2003.
- It ranked 38th in eighth-grade math, down from 34th in 2003.

The report is focused on the fourth-grade reading results because of how crucial it is for students to be able to read well by the end of third grade though students have also struggled in math.

The achievement problem crosses demographic lines. Consider how various demographic groups in Michigan compared with similar demographic groups nationwide in fourth-grade reading in 2015: White students in Michigan ranked 49th, higherincome students in Michigan ranked 48th, and black students in Michigan ranked 41st.

The problem? "Many other states are outpacing Michigan, which has posted mostly stagnant - and in some cases declining - results."

One of the LWV Texas priorities is to oppose legislation that would allow tax dollars to be used to provide vouchers so students could attend private schools. This essay was written by Sue Legg, Education Director of the LWV Florida.

Not All Choices Are Good Choices: History of Florida's Tax Credit Program

According to a Tampa Bay Times report, Jeb Bush, in a televised debate when he was running for governor in 1994 and was asked what he would do for black voters, said, "It's time to strive for a society where there's equality of opportunity, not equality of results. So I'm going to answer your question by saying 'probably nothing'." Faced with criticism, he helped establish Florida's first charter school in Miami, and the school choice movement in Florida began.

In 1998, John Kirtley, a venture capitalist, personally funded private school scholarships to low-income children. He took the idea to then Representative Joe Negron, who is now the President of the Florida Senate. Jeb Bush was governor, and the state's voucher and corporate tax credit scholarship programs began.

Florida's constitution, however, prohibited the direct or indirect transfer of money from the state treasury to private schools. In 2006, the Florida Supreme Court ruled that vouchers paid by the treasury were unconstitutional. Florida corporate tax credits (FTC) became the vehicle to fund what initially were private school scholarships for children from disadvantaged families.

Corporations could donate owed taxes to Step Up for Students, a private non-profit organization which issued tuition warrants to qualified parents. These FTC scholarships have also been litigated. According to Politico, in 2016 Betsy DeVos paid one million dollars through her foundation to send thousands of children to Tallahassee for a rally against the FTC scholarship lawsuit. In 2017, the Florida Supreme Court determined the lawsuit lacked standing and declined to rule on the constitutionality issue.

Step Up for Students is the management organization for the Florida Tax Credit scholarship program. John Kirtley is Chair of the Board and founder. Its President, Doug Tuthill, achieved notoriety in a 2011 video when he revealed that over one million dollars was spent in every other election cycle on local races. The strategy is to make low-income families the face of the program and target black ministers to support the program. Step Up for Students has grown into a \$500 million dollar operation. It currently allocates nearly 100,000 FTC scholarships to over 1,700 of Florida's private schools.

In addition, it administers the Gardiner scholarships for students with severe disabilities and the Alabama Opportunity Scholarships. The FTC scholarships program alone costs \$422,648,470. Administrative expenses total about \$5 million dollars, but other budget categories include \$4 million dollars for communications and advocacy programs related to Step Up's advocacy for choice mission including RedefinEd. its newsletter.

Audit findings in 2015-16 noted that Step Up was lax in its recovery of funds from private schools that received tuition warrants from students who did not enroll. In 2016, this amount was \$252,363. Auditors also noted that Step Up failed to conduct required financial background checks on all private schools participating in the program.

The engine of the choice movement is Jeb Bush's Foundation for Excellence in Education (ExcelinEd). It provides model legislation, rule-making expertise, implementation strategies, and public outreach to 38 states. Betsy DeVos was a board member until she was confirmed as the U.S. Secretary of Education. Eighty-two percent of FTC students attend religious schools. The FTC program does not target struggling public schools. Only 25% of FTC students are from public schools that had 'D' or 'F' school grades. A few well-connected, wealthy Floridians launched a movement that nearly twenty years later has earned extraordinary publicity and grown exponentially.

Yet, traditional public schools continue to outperform charters or FTC private schools. Communities most impacted by school choice experience a downward spiral. Schools are underfunded and become more segregated. This is not a model for the nation to follow.



The EPA Has Started to Remove Obama-Era Information

The Environmental Protection Agency's website has begun to transform under the Trump Administration.

This article was originally featured on Climate Central.

A group of researchers have found what are likely the first steps in a major overhaul of a site that's been <u>closely watched</u> since President Trump's inauguration on Jan. 20. Federal climate plans created under former President Obama, tribal assistance programs, and references to international cooperation have been stricken from the site.

A mention of carbon pollution as a cause of climate change has also been removed and adaptation has been emphasized, indicating an attempt to separate the cause of climate change from the response. Some of the changes — like removing mentions to programs and task forces that have run their course as well as broken links — are housekeeping, according to an agency statement.

One priority for her is to develop more appropriate solutions to this situation. We also discussed Parkland Hospital and how proud we can all be of the new hospital. Visitors are coming from all over the United States to see it because it is an outstanding example of what a county hospital could be.

We also learned that Dallas County is considering implementing voting centers and online registration to facilitate the voting process for citizens.

Attendees enjoyed the luncheon and the opportunity to get to know one of our county commissioners more personally. We are also pleased that Commissioner Daniel is a long-time member of the League.
